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The Barcelona Housing Consortium (CHB) is made up of the Catalan Government and Barcelona City Council, and it works to improve housing-related services in the city.

Within Barcelona's municipal boundaries,

it is tasked with carrying out public housing functions, activities and services that it is exclusively granted, under Article 85 of the Barcelona Municipal Charter. More specifically, it is responsible for planning, scheduling and managing public housing policies for both owned and rented dwellings.

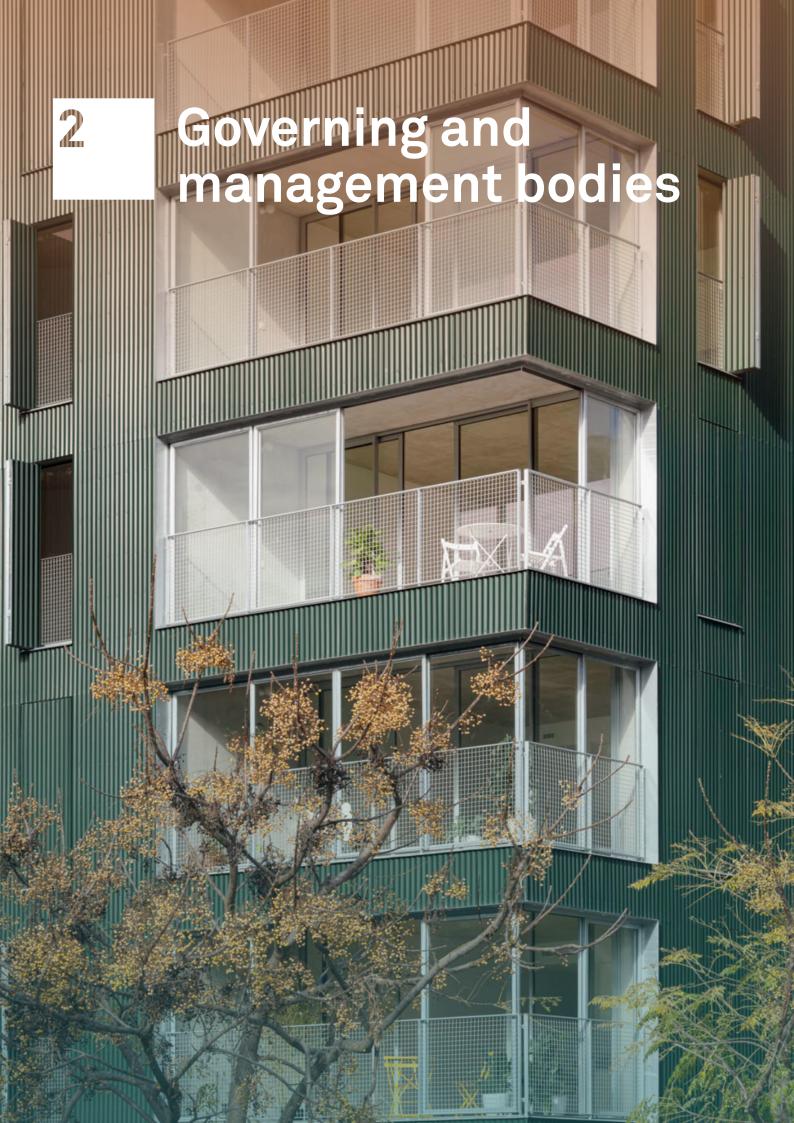
It may also perform other housing-related functions, activities and services established by the authorities in the consortium.

THE CONSORTIUM CARRIES OUT THE FOLLOWING FUNCTIONS:

- Planning public-housing initiatives within the Barcelona municipal area.
- Planning developments directly or in collaboration with other public-housing bodies in Barcelona.
- Promoting an affordable-rental housing policy, in particular for young people or other groups with specific requirements.
- Planning neighbourhood remodelling and renovation initiatives that need to be carried out in Barcelona.
- Planning and promoting renovations, repairs and improvements in existing neighbourhoods with public housing developments.
- Controlling, supervising and monitoring of the actions carried out, if applicable, by the personalised bodies in charge of the management of public housing.

- Managing the public housing stock and, with prior delegation, the public land estate intended for housing of the consortia administrations intended to make effective the right of citizens to access decent and adequate housing.
- Managing, with prior delegation, the land whose ownership corresponds to other administrations in the city.
- Drafting, processing and approving regulations for establishing the criteria used in selecting and accessing public housing.
- Designing policies to provide attention to citizens in matters of housing and, in particular, managing the Barcelona Register of Social Housing Applicants.
- Carrying out activities that promote housing renovations, by approving the planning, scheduling, management and implementation tools necessary for their effectiveness.
- Promoting housing rental subsidies and benefits, approving all the planning, programming, management and execution instruments necessary for their effectiveness.
- Comprehensively managing the social housing pools and approving the planning, scheduling, management and implementation tools necessary for their effectiveness.

For the purposes of carrying out these tasks and achieving all the goals, the Consortium, which has no human resources of its own, engages the municipal authority's other specialist bodies with managing the respective initiative programmes under the corresponding agreements.



The Consortium is divided up into the following bodies:

CONSULTATIVE AND PARTICIPATORY

Social Housing Council

The Barcelona Social Housing Council (BSHC) comes under the framework of the Barcelona Housing Consortium, which is made up of the Catalan Government and Barcelona City Council, as a consultative and participatory body on housing policies in the city. Its members not only include the municipal and regional authorities but also public bodies and companies involved in the planning and construction of housing, private associations of developers and builders, social-support associations and organisations concerned with housing access, cooperative organisations, the local residents' movement, unions, social foundations, universities and professional associations, among others.

BUDGET SETTLEMENT FOR 2023

Law 2/2023, of 16 March, on the budgets of the Government of Catalonia for 2023 published in the Official Gazette of the Government of Catalonia (DOGC) no. 8877 of 17 March 2023, set out the budgets of the Government of Catalonia for 2023.

The initial budget of the Barcelona Housing Consortium was €44,690,024.84.

After various credit amendments to the initial budget, including the incorporation of carryovers, the definitive credits amounted to €170.63 million, of which €54.61 million were to be financed with resources from the same budget and €116.02 million with the remaining liquidity surplus.

The 2023 budget, and as in previous years, provided for the management of the Barcelona Housing Office Network's services and the advice and information service they offer; the operation of Barcelona's Register of Applicants for Social Housing; renovation management and

grants, rental subsidies, and the management of-housing pool and young persons' housing pool.

The rights recognised in the execution of the 2023 budget were for a total of €54.61 million, in order to finance:

- €11.47 million from 2023 and €4 million of remaining balances, in total €15.5 million under the heading of provision of CHB management services by the Municipal Institute of Housing and Renovation of Barcelona (IMHAB) and the Municipal Institute of Urban Landscape (IMPU) for the collaboration agreements signed with these subsidiary bodies of Barcelona City Council. This is in addition to the expenses assigned to the CHB for recurrent services invoiced by the Centre for Telecommunications and Information Technologies, an organisation dependent on the Government of Catalonia.
- €2.75 million earmarked for renovation.
- €26 million for renovation subsidies from NextGeneration funds and €5 million from municipal funds to complement the NextGeneration renovation calls.
- €15.84 million of municipal funding to complement calls made for European funds.

The calls for grants and subsidies approved in 2022 and funded with budget resources and the allocated liquidity surplus have totalled €82.80 million, distributed as follows:

€5.66 million corresponding to calls for grant applications for the rental payments, socialemergency allowances and the housing pool. Resources were also committed due to the extension of the agreement formalised with the Hàbitat 3 Foundation for a total amount of €5.6 million and a collaboration agreement with the AHC for the rental housing fund of €0.6 million.

The obligations recognised in 2023 due to subsidies and grants totalled €20.04 million, broken down as follows: renovation grants, €7.81 million; rent subsidies, €6.47 million, and the Fundació Hàbitat agreement, €5.76 million.

In closing the budget, the committed resources (in phase D of budget execution) totalled €72.23 million: €15.55 million for the provision of services; €39.89 million corresponding to renovation grants; €6.14 million to the agreement with the Habitat3 Foundation, and the rest, €10.65 million, to rent subsidies.

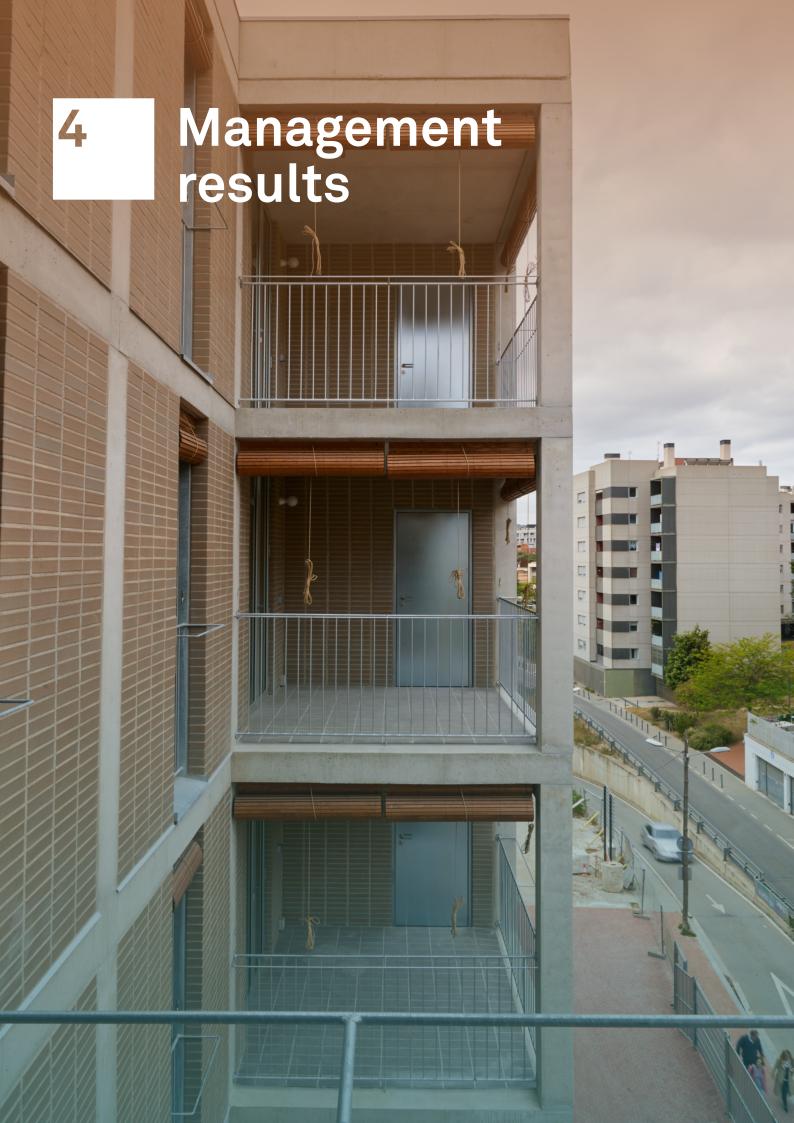

WORK TARGETS ACHIEVED IN 2023

Housing Offices Network

The housing offices maintained their level of activity as regards the number of services and consolidated the management of appointments, waiting times and assistance with the Qmatic system.

- Continuous training for housing office staff.
- Consolidation of the "Habitatge et truca" service as an outsourced management programme that offers assistance to the public in relation to the range of services that housing offices provide over the phone.

Decent use of housing

Advice

In 2023, the number of legal advice applications on housing matters at housing offices was over 6,500, and in rental mediation procedures, the number exceeded 710 situations.

Mediation and prevention as the most effective tool for avoiding risk situations that could lead to the loss of housing is still one of the crosscutting measures.

To avoid evictions, and with a view to ensuring families stay in their homes, the intervention unit analyses the situations detected, works on a diagnosis and proposes an intervention strategy. The incentives linked to mediation have been consolidated.

In the case of families facing legal proceedings for unpaid rent, the incentive of up to €6,000 is aimed at paying rent arrears and, in other cases, the incentive of €1,500 is for owners. Both cases require a lease to be signed within the framework of Barcelona's Rental Housing Pool.

Procuring housing and avoiding evictions

An <u>intervention and support unit has been</u> <u>set up in housing offices</u> to deal with housing pressure, with the aim of analysing the detected situations, carry out a diagnosis and design an intervention strategy.

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The inclusion of new dwellings in the Housing Pool has remained constant, as owners have considered it a safe alternative with particular benefits when compared to the market.

Rental Housing Pool

The cumulative number of leases signed as part of the Rental Housing Pool in 2023 was maintained as a result of lease renewals through mediation and new leases.

The <u>advantages for the owners</u>: guaranteed collection of rental income, the subsidy for interior renovation work, incentives for inclusion and the technical, legal and social support continue to be a proposal that is very greatly valued by the owners.

Grants for housing payments

The Housing Consortium published two calls for grant applications: one for <u>social-emergency</u> <u>allowances resulting from mediation</u>, with a total budget of epsilon1,153,493.08, and one for <u>rent payment allowances</u>, with a total budget of epsilon4,206,065.62.

The Catalan Housing Agency published the call for grants for rental payments for people who were beneficiaries in the previous year.

The Catalan Housing Agency published three calls for grants to help with rent: <u>for people</u> aged 65 and over, for people aged between 36 and 64 and for young people aged 35 and under.

The Catalan Housing Agency maintained the special emergency financial assistance to deal with emergency situations in the field of housing and the procedure for monitoring and verifying compliance with the requirements for renewing the supplementary benefit in order to continue paying the rent and the benefit to deal with situations of loss of housing.

The Housing Consortium published the call for grants to include housing in Barcelona's Rental Housing Pool.

The Housing Agency published the call for grants to pay the cost of renting private market housing for people in a situation of economic and social emergency and at risk of residential exclusion.

Register of Social Housing Applicants

Registrations and allocations

An increase can be seen in the volume of registrations recorded in the last year. There are currently <u>35,471 registered household units</u>, which is up on the previous year by just over 17%.

The number of homes included in allocation processes amounted to 121 second allocation flats and 532 first allocation flats. This represents a decrease of 17.7% and an increase of 69.4%, respectively, compared to the homes included in the allocation processes of the previous year.

Housing committee for social emergencies

The year 2023 saw a total of 368 socialemergency applications in response to loss of dwellings, representing a 8.7% increase on the previous year.

Renovation aid

The following calls for renovation-grant applications were carried out in 2023:

- Dwelling interiors (housing pool)
- Publication of calls for NextGeneration applications:

In 2022, a transitional year between the previous calls for grants for common building and interior elements and the new European NextGeneration funding, only ongoing cases were resolved and no new ones were processed.

The Housing Offices managed all the habitability certificate applications submitted to them, as well as those forwarded for processing after submission to local area services and those submitted online.



THE CONSORTIUM'S WEBSITE

The Consortium's website is a digital space providing city residents with comprehensive information on the housing services and procedures that it offers. The website was created to provide a first step for anyone interested, making it easy to find information on rental grants, the Housing Pool and other services. It is ultimately a meeting place that offers city residents guidance on how to carry out the grant-application procedures and inperson support programmes at the Barcelona Housing Offices Network.

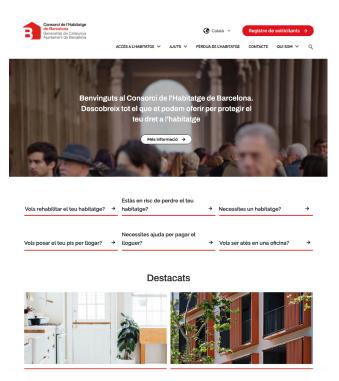
The space has been co-hosted on a municipal website (https://habitatge.barcelona/ca) since 2016, which acts as a gateway to all housing services in the city irrespective of their provider. The inclusion of the Consortium's services into this website has helped to create a single meeting point. while also redirecting users to each specific section. This has led to an increase in the number of visits, not only to the Housing portal but also the Consortium's website. These visits are of an increasingly high quality (longer duration and accessing specific content).

The digital project for disseminating digital housing content includes several internal improvements that are being introduced to improve the general public's access to information. This means that the housing web products are worked on together even if they are different websites in order to guarantee the validity of the information, its usefulness, the interconnection and, therefore, a more efficient user experience.

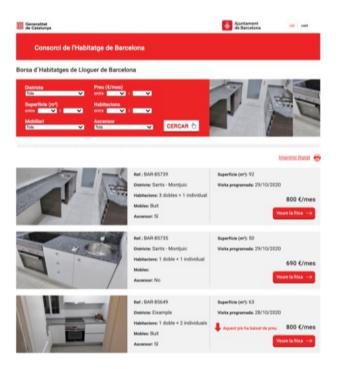
A specific working group has also been created to renew the consortium's website to facilitate

its use, clarifying the contents and prioritising essential content. In this group, work has been undertaken internally and externally to assess the website's features and the level of user interaction, which has helped to detect content that has been omitted or "covered up" by the large volume of information. The aim is to move forward and establish the foundations for a new website with technology and content on the agenda.

In 2023, updates were made to both the Consortium website, to publish updated content, and to the Barcelona Housing portal, to ensure that the information was coherent and consistent. Information has been processed from the user's point of view without taking access into account: the content has been standardised across both websites.



The Consortium has other specialised web spaces by subject, such as the apartment portal of the Barcelona Rental Housing Pool, the website of the Applicants Register and the intranet of the Social Housing Council. Specifically, in 2023, processes have been undertaken to stabilise this application and its features to guarantee its use.

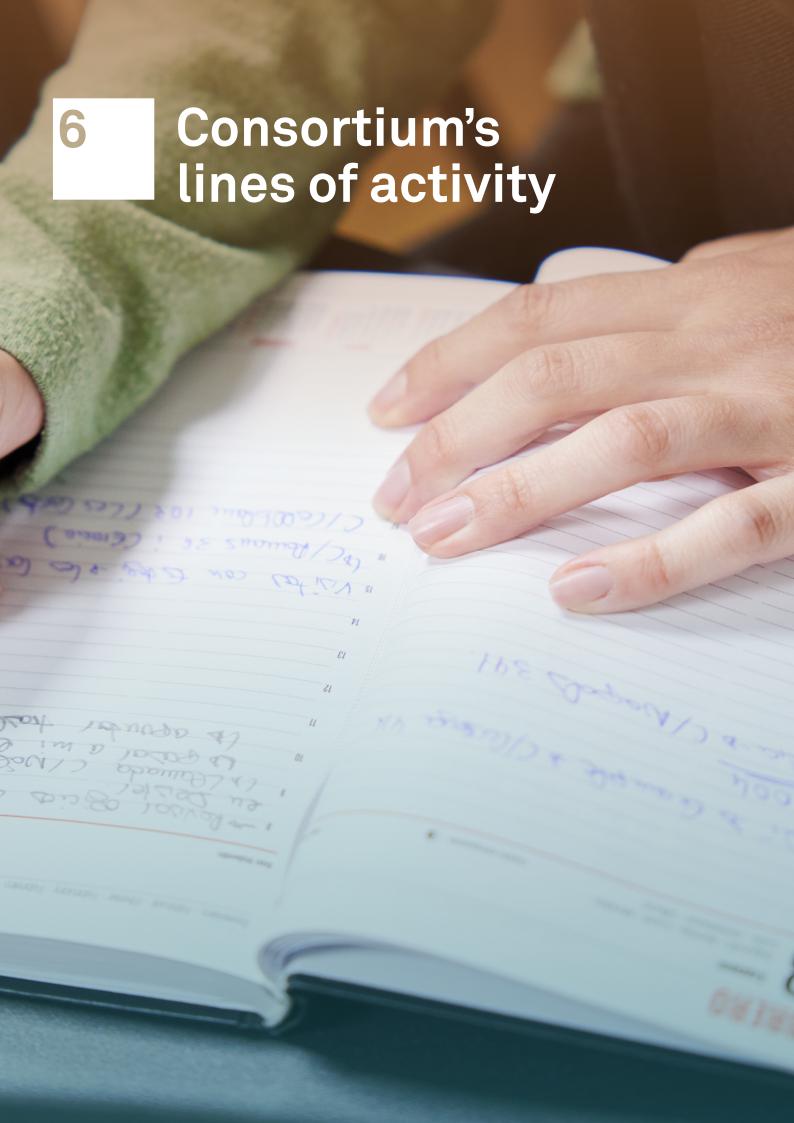


COMMUNICATION CAMPAIGNS

Housing is a basic human right that contributes to social integration and quality of life. Housing policy is a part of the broader social policy framework promoted by Barcelona City Council, which takes an integrated approach across the city to ensure services that support people in meeting their basic housing needs. For this reason, all services and issues are peoplecentred, in line with the Barcelona Right to Housing Plan 2016-2025.

Over the course of the year, various communication campaigns have been launched to communicate specific messages to support the policies being carried out or to promote services and grants available to the public.

- NGEU campaign Campaign app, conceptualised and promoted by the Communications Department, on NextGeneration renovation grants with European funds. This is extended throughout the year with different applications and adaptations to cover everything for the call period.
- Campaign for the Rental Housing
 Pool. The aim was to inform the
 public, especially homeowners, about
 Barcelona's Rental Housing Pool, which
 is managed by the City Council. It sought
 to make property owners aware of the
 benefits of transferring their flats to
 the programme and stress the social
 responsibility implied in letting through
 this service. The campaign included both
 online and offline advertising strategies.



BARCELONA HOUSING OFFICES NETWORK

The Consortium offers its services through the Barcelona Housing Offices Network.

The following from 2023 is worth mention:

- Consolidation of queue managers in all housing offices to improve access.
- Consolidation of the security service in the offices.

- Incentives of €1,500 for leaving private dwellings with the Housing Pool or of up to €6,000 for regularising legal proceedings in progress for rent arrears.

- Discount of 95% of the total property tax due during the lifetime of the lease agreement.
- Legal, technical and social advice for Housing Pool dwellings.

Social-emergency committee

 Allocation of dwellings for social emergencies from the Social Housing Pool or other temporary residential resources.

GRANTS FOR BUILDING AND HOUSING RENOVATIONS

• Call for grant applications for 2023

The first calls for grants with NextGeneration funds was published in June 2022. Royal Decree 853/2021, of 5 October, regulates the grant programmes for renovation and the improvement of energy efficiency in housing. It sets out the following programmes:

- Subsidy programme for neighbourhood renovation projects (P1)
- Support programme for the renovation of offices (P2)
- Subsidy programme for building renovation actions (P3)
- Grant programme for improving energy efficiency in housing (P4)
- Subsidy programme for the preparation of the building renovation logbook and the drafting of renovation projects (P5)

The Catalan Housing Agency and the Barcelona Housing Consortium have signed a collaboration agreement to manage grants under the residential renovation grant programmes of the Recovery, Transformation and Resilience Plan, funded by the NextGeneration EU funds, within the municipality of Barcelona. As a result, so far, €68 million have been allocated by agreement and work is under way to add an additional €26 million (these amounts are for 2021 and 2022).

To promote rehabilitation in the city of Barcelona, information sessions have been held in the neighbourhoods, communication and dissemination campaigns have been organised and the Municipal Renovation Office and the Technical Office for Urban Regeneration have made themselves available to the public.

Likewise, institutional coordination mechanisms have been put in place, such as fortnightly meetings with professional associations, as well as the Catalan Housing Agency and the Metropolitan Housing Consortium.

According to monitoring data provided to the Catalan Housing Agency on 25 January 2024, 200 cases corresponding to 2,419 homes have been resolved to date, which represents a total planned investment of approximately €100 million and committed subsidies for an approximate amount of €25 million.



Renovation grants have **knock-on effects**, as they enable local residents
to stay put, have an impact on **sustainability, habitability, innovation and energy efficiency** and improve the
urban landscape.

In addition to the NextGeneration calls, the call for housing interiors was published:

• The call for grants for renovating the interiors of homes to be included in the Barcelona Rental Housing Pool, aimed at people who own a home on the free market that they are putting at the disposal of the Rental Housing Pool, and which subsidises actions costing up to €20,000 to make the home habitable or to adapt the facilities inside it to improve its habitability.

Managing habitability certificates

Habitability certificates are administrative documents which confirm that a dwelling meets the minimum habitability standards provided for under current regulations and that it is suitable for use as a residence for people, without prejudice to its use for other authorised activities.

In 2023, habitability certificates for brandnew and used buildings could be submitted to Barcelona Housing offices and to the headquarters of the Catalan Housing Agency's area services in Barcelona.

Barcelona's housing offices have managed 88.6% of all applications for second-occupancy certificates submitted.

Barcelona's housing offices issued habitability certificates for a total of 19,367 of the city's dwellings.

The technical staff at offices have undertaken a total of **519 inspections** to check the condition of the dwellings.

BARCELONA REGISTER OF SOCIAL HOUSING APPLICANTS

In 2023, the Register continued with the allocation processes initiated the previous year and carried out tasks and actions related to new registrations.

It is worth highlighting the following:

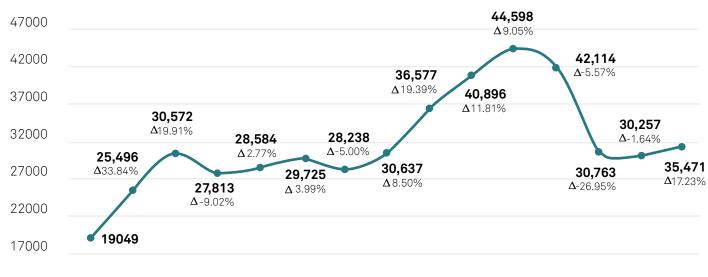
- A total of 121 second-allocation flats and 532 first-allocation flats were included in the allocation processes held in 2023, under both the draw and needs-scale systems.
- The number of **valid registrations** on 31 December 2023 was **35,471 household units** (70,960 people), representing a 17% increase on the previous year's registrations.
- In 2023, a total of 37,813 applications were received by the Registry, of which 15,518 have been registrations, 5,754 modifications

- and 16,541 renewals, which represents an increase of 21% in registrations, 43% in modifications and decrease of 6% in renovations. It is worth noting that, once a modification is approved, the validity period of the registration is renewed, which may explain the drop in renovations. The increase over the previous year in the total number of applications is 10%.
- As for de-registrations from the Register in 2023, these were down by 20% on the previous year due to the increase in applications for modifications.

• Entry in the Register

In 2023, there was a 17% increase in the number of current registrations compared to the previous year.

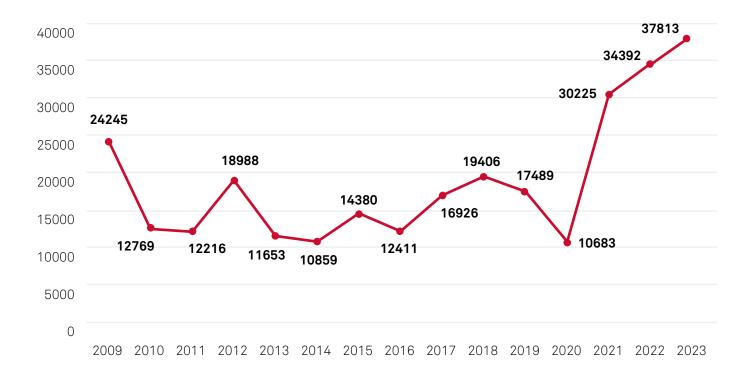
Valid registrations per year

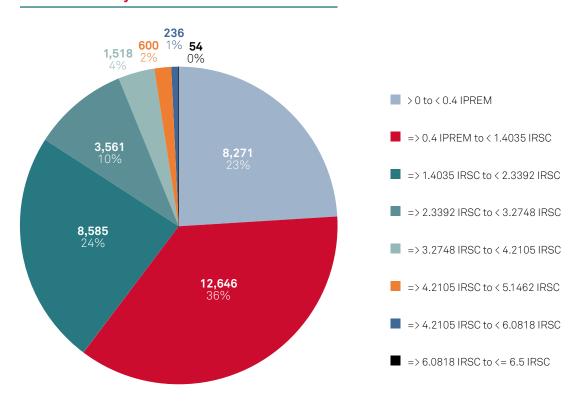

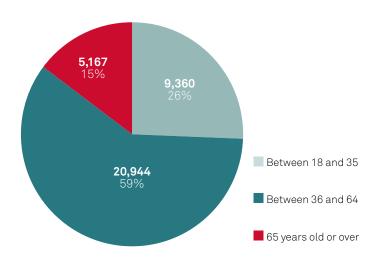

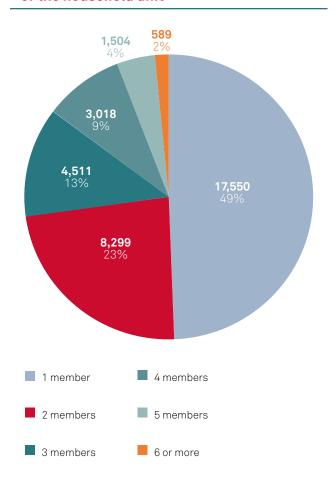
· Distribution by age



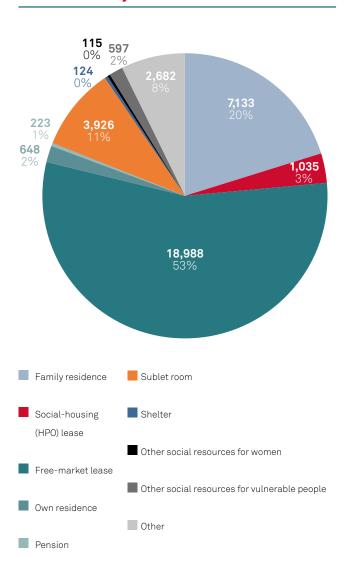

• Distribution by current residence



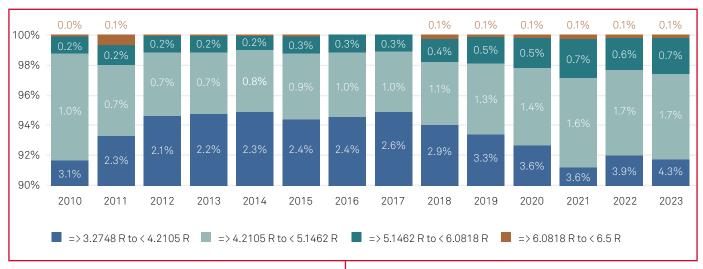

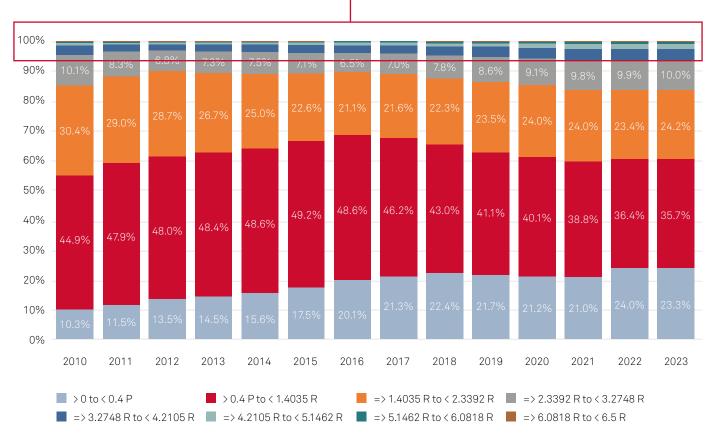
The profile of applicant household units is constantly evolving, as illustrated in the following charts (particularly in relation to variables such as income, age, household unit size, nationality, housing tenure requested and disability).

Income

The previously observed trend of increasing poverty among households applying for housing has remained the same, particularly within the lowest income brackets. There has been a slight economic improvement compared to living units with higher income ranges.

Income: P = IPREM and R = IRSC

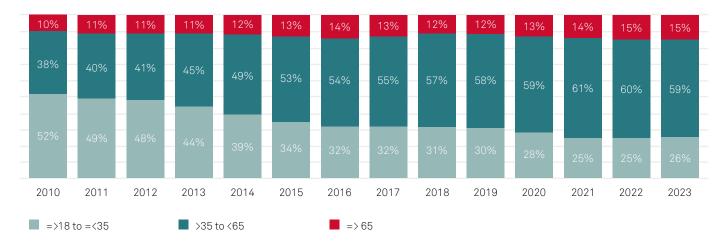




Age

There has been a continuing reverse trend in demand in relation to the age of applicants: during the early years of the Register, most applicants were under the age of 35, representing 52%, while the 35 to 65-year old group represented 38% of the total. Today, the

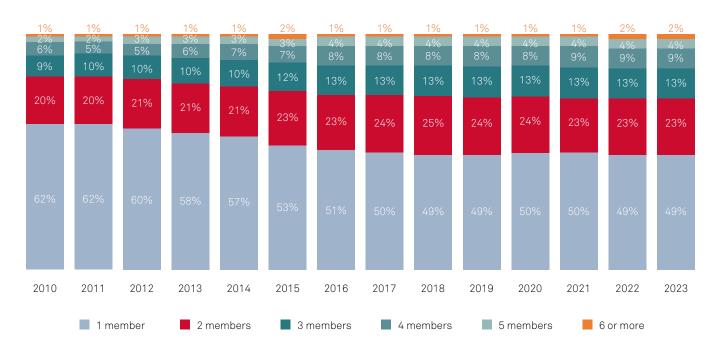
35 to 65-year old group make 59%, while the younger group accounts for 26% of applicants. There was a slight increase in the number of people over the age of 65, from 10% in 2010 to 15% today.



Number of household-unit members

A change in the composition of household units has also been seen over time. During the Register of Applicants' first years, singlemember household units were the majority group (62%). In the last eight years we have seen the composition of household units as regards the number of members. Single-

member household units accounted for 49% of registrations in the Register of Officially Protected Housing Applicants, while those with two or three members accounted for 23% and 13%, respectively. They are followed by household units with four members.

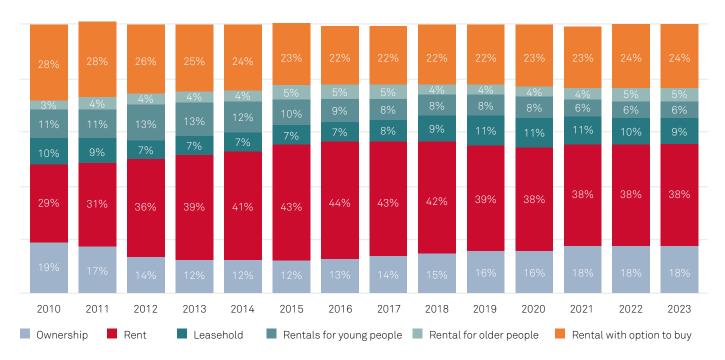


Type of protection requested

A certain stabilisation can be observed, compared to 2021, in terms of the percentage of the types sought.

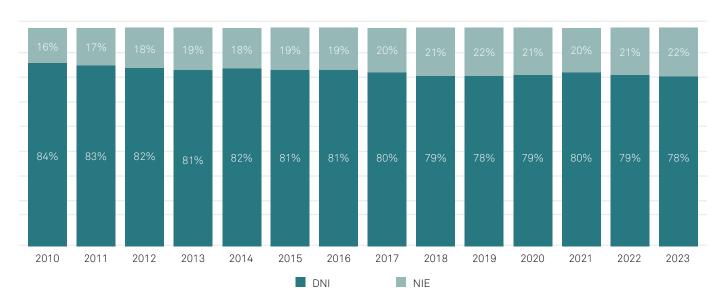

The proportion of people registered with NIE and DNI has remained practically the same over

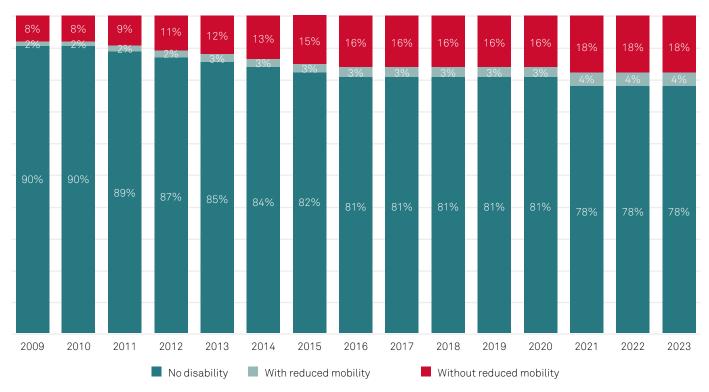

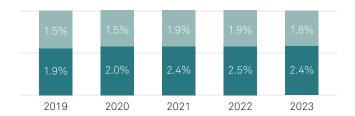

Household members with disabilities

Since 2015, there has been a stabilisation of the percentage with respect to the rest of the household units with one of their members with a disability, which stood at 22% in 2023. Among these 22%, 4% are people with reduced mobility* (although this percentage has also increased: initially it was 2%), of whom 1.8% need adapted housing; this percentage has increased slightly in recent years.

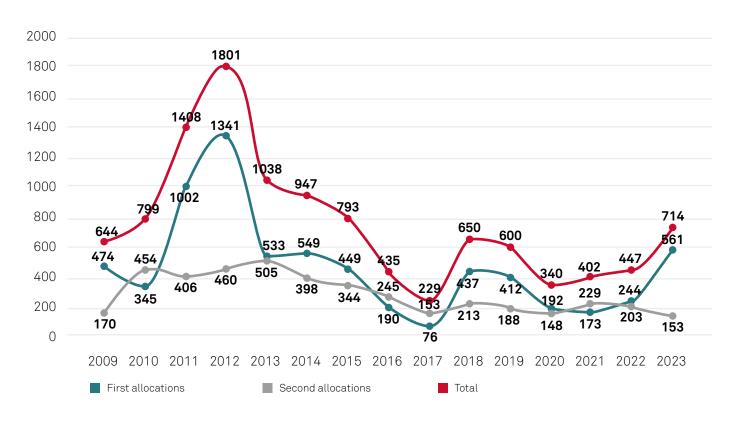

A high number of awards were dealt with in 2011 and 2012, given the volume of housing units that were awarded in the various calls for applications during those years. The figure gradually dropped in the following years to 2018 and 2019, when there was a partial recovery that culminated in 2023.

· Main reasons for waived allocations

During 2023, the most significant waived allocations were mainly subjective causes (did not like the area or flat, already had a flat, etc.). In contrast, there was a drop in the number of waived allocations due to the person's economic situation/unemployment, house price or mortgage denial.

HOUSING ALLOCATIONS FOR SOCIAL-EMERGENCY SITUATIONS

In cases of vulnerability and imminent loss of housing, the Consortium allocates dwellings from the Social Rental Housing Fund through the Barcelona Social Emergency Board.

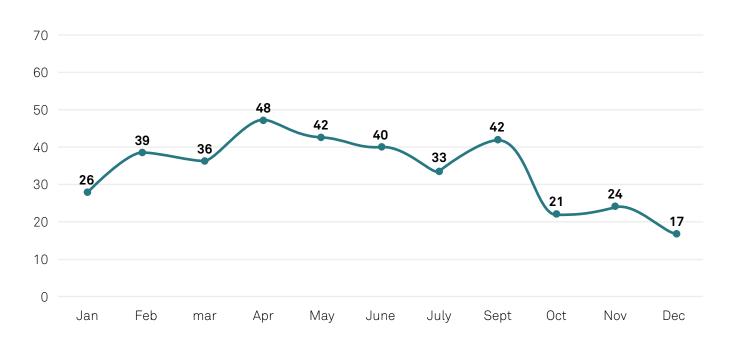
The Board is tasked with assessing cases heard at Barcelona's Housing offices and allocating dwellings from the Social Rental Housing Fund available at the time of the Board's meeting.

Assessment Board

In 2023, eleven meetings were held by the Assessment Board, in order to allocate dwellings in response to emergency situations. A total of 368 new loss-of-home situations were analysed, with a total of 190 emergency cases considered, in which 135 dwellings from the Social Rental Housing Fund were allocated. An alternative solution was found for 63 applications. 23 cases were still being processed as at 31 December 2023.

701 cases were favourably assessed by the Emergencies Board and were awaiting allocation of a dwelling on 31 December 2023.

Applications analysed by the Assessment Board in 2023

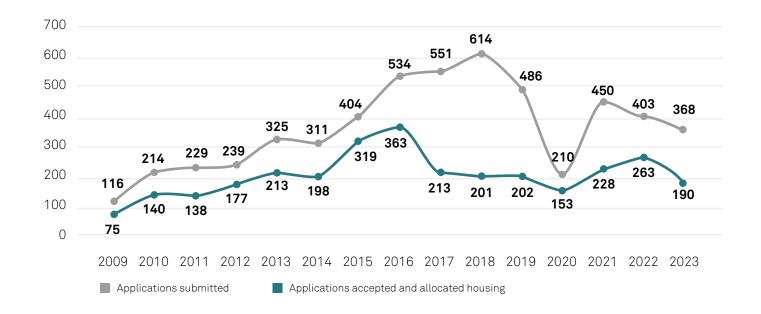

DECENT USE OF HOUSING

The current social and economic situation continues to drive high demand for this area of the Consortium's activity.



Legal advice remained a relevant service in 2023. The majority of consultations, more than 90% of the total, related to rental issues.

Property harassment

A rise in problematic situations was detected throughout 2023, where tenants found themselves at risk of losing their home through legal proceedings from owners. These situations were tackled through protection against possible property mobbing.

Over the course of the year, the legal services of the Housing Offices have analysed a total of 17 new situations potentially involving coercive actions against tenants and the corresponding mediation was initiated between the parties to resolve the dispute.

To address situations of possible propertymobbing in particular, the housing offices assess and analyse the specific case in a coordinated manner, as appropriate, with the Housing Discipline Unit, and undertake a diagnosis, an intervention strategy and apply it.

In regard to this line of action, the Housing Discipline Unit's use of administrative procedures against property-mobbing should be noted, as an intervention tool to deal with these situations.

• Information and advice service on mortgagepayment arrears (Ofideute)

Ofideute aims to assist city residents with their difficulties relating to mortgage payments and their contractual liabilities.

The service may also intercede between families and the financial organisations that granted the mortgages, in order to broker suitable solutions adapted to the current payment capacities of the parties concerned, making it possible for their credit to be returned and preventing the loss of their homes; or otherwise reaching an inexpensive termination of the loan.

Since July 2012, the Housing Offices have been assisting people who request this service, analysing their financial situation and, if necessary, proposing the most appropriate solution for referral to the Ofideute service, which in turn is tasked with intervening with the mortgage lenders in each case.

• Rent-mediation service

Launched in October 2012, the rent-mediation service aims to assist city residents in situations where they find it difficult to pay their rent, with the intention of opening negotiations with the property owner, where necessary, in order to find the most suitable solution that enables the tenants to keep their home.

In 2016, new negotiation tools were introduced within the service, leading to an increase in the number of cases assessed and addressed through mediation. Worth particular mention is the call for applications for allowances for maintaining

rented dwellings and for mediation referrals and incentives for including dwellings subject to court proceedings into Barcelona's Rental Housing pool, which helped to increase the possibilities for resolution and agreement that would prevent the loss of homes.



Since its launch in October 2012, the housing offices' legal service has carried out a total of 9,955 mediations, of which 5,870 have been concluded, with favourable agreements reached in 47% of cases.

Public-Housing Protection, Intervention and Mediation Team

At the end of 2014, this service was launched to operate in public, social or publicly managed housing—primarily those included in the Social Rental Housing Fund or eligible to be included in it.

Functions requiring implementation were focused on four areas:

- Reception and accompaniment for new public-housing tenants for integration into the housing environment and with the local resident community.
- Mediation in disputes, in collaboration with all the players (promoters, social services) for implementing the best intervention strategy.

- Analysis and assessment of possible cases of payment arrears or rent-payment difficulties and proposed action.
- Monitoring tenants' contractual obligations and action in the face of possible payment defaults.
- In 2023, the Public-Housing Prevention, Intervention and Mediation Service carried out **over 830 interventions.**

• Loss of Home and Employment Intervention Service (SIPHO) in the city of Barcelona

SIPHO works with families facing eviction, providing social support to prevent evictions from being carried out and to manage and mitigate the consequences of housing loss.

The SIPHO service intervenes preventively in situations of possible loss of housing, providing the necessary support to the affected households, developing communication functions, and promoting mediation procedures with the people involved and the owners, in order to reach agreements between the parties that favour maintenance of the home, to try to prevent loss of the home and, if that is not possible, reduce the effects that this loss can generate.

The functions carried out were centred on:

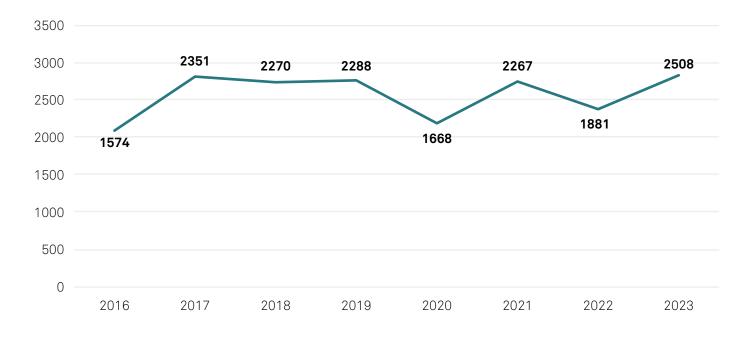
- Action on evictions and forced evictions affecting vulnerable people and families who require specialised social and educational support for managing and minimising the effects of losing their homes.
- Immediate, intensive, preventive and proactive intervention.
- The service also acts in cases of squatting.
- Assistance in the case of evictions.
- Social support.
- · Communication and mediation.
- Analysis and diagnosis of unstable and vulnerable residential situations.

BARCELONA RENTAL HOUSING POOL

Mediation services between owners of empty homes and potential tenants, with the aim of increasing the number of rental homes at affordable prices.

It is answerable to the Consortium and managed through the housing offices and the technical action programme department for the decent use of housing and rent-payment grants.

- A total of 633 properties were managed, of which 187 were added to the Social Rental Housing Pool by the end of the financial year. 43% of the dwellings inspected required renovation work to make them habitable.
- Incentives for property owners were maintained, with particular emphasis on:
 - Guaranteed rental income payments.
 - Subsidies for work on dwelling interiors.
 - Incentives for including vacant properties or regularising homes involved in ongoing legal proceedings due to rent arrears.
 - A 95% discount on the property tax (IBI).
 - Technical, legal, and social support.
- In 2023, the Rental Housing Pool facilitated the signing of 240 new contracts.
- By the end of the year, the total number of active contracts stood at 1.312.

Proposals to link the Social Rental Housing Pool with other forms of

support (incentives for signing lease agreements, ongoing tenancy or urgent situations) have been maintained. These measures aim to help tenants remain in their homes or make it easier for them to access housing.

Mediation incentives were maintained, with the aim of preventing evictions and enabling families to keep their homes.

In cases where families are involved in legal proceedings, an incentive of up to €6,000 is available, provided the situation is regularised through a signed lease agreement with the same family or household unit under the Social Rental Housing Pool.

- Municipal rent guarantee or "avalloguer" (universal coverage for rent arrears, up to 6 months).
- Free technical, legal and social advice and monitoring.
- Free lease-management service.
- Insurance:
 - Legal defence for payment defaults.
 - Household multi-risk.
- Processing habitability and energy-efficiency certificates.
- 95% discount on property tax (IBI).
- Subsidies, for work on habitability of flats, of up to €20,000.
- Incentives of €1,500 for inclusion of a vacant dwelling and incentives for regularising dwellings involved in legal actions, of up to €6,000.

Until 2019, property owners who kept their homes rented through the Social Rental Housing Pool could apply for a subsidy covering 50% of their property tax (IBI) bill.

In 2020, this subsidy was replaced by a 95% IBI discount, granted once the property was declared of special interest or municipal utility at the owner's request.

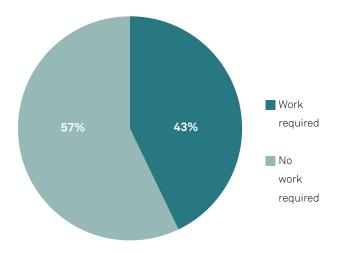

The advantages for homeowners as a whole continue to be a very competitive proposition, especially in cases where the dwellings need work to make them habitable.

Some 43% of contracted properties received refurbishment grants, with an average amount of €17,690 per property.

The main channel for informing and attracting new property owners were the Housing website and the HAB-ET call-back service ("Habitatge et truca"), reflecting the shift to digital management and a decline in referrals from Housing Offices.

ASSIGNMENT OF USE OF PRIVATE HOUSING TO THE BARCELONA SOCIAL **EMERGENCY BOARD AND THE** HOUSING FIRST, "REALLOTGEM" AND TEMPORARY TOURIST HOUSING (HUT) **PROGRAMMES**

On 7 March 2019, a new agreement was signed between the Barcelona Housing Consortium and the Hàbitat3 Third Sector Social Foundation, expanding the management mandate for the housing cession programme from 250 to 350 dwellings allocated to the Emergency Board. In addition, it also took over the management of the dwellings included in the Housing First programme run by the Department of Social Care for the Homeless, part of the Directorate of Social Intervention Services – Social Rights – to oversee the 50 dwellings currently available and to increase them by 25 more, to a total of 76 units.

The cession (assignment of housing use) programme continued to acquire properties to replace those whose cession periods had ended and supply the Emergency Board for new allocations, with the aim of reaching the target of 350 dwellings set out in the agreement.

As part of the Housing First programme, the agreement's target of 76 housing units has been reached.

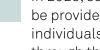
In relation to the agreements for assigning tourist flats to families on the Emergency Board's waiting list as temporary housing, when the agreements expired in 2023 and once the families were relocated to other housing, a start was made on returning the flats to the tourist operators. Regarding the agreements still in force, collaboration with the tourist flat operators has continued. Likewise, social support was provided until a permanent home from the Emergency Board became available.

In partnership with the Catalan Housing Agency (AHC), efforts were also made to recruit properties for the "Reallotgem" (Let's Rehouse) programme. Vacant homes owned by private individuals were managed so that a direct

lease agreement could be signed with the AHC, allowing the agency to make these homes available to the Emergency Board ("Reallotgem" 1"). At the same time, the programme continued to include homes with residents facing eviction proceedings, aiming to regularise their situation through a new lease agreement signed with the AHC ("Reallotgem 2").

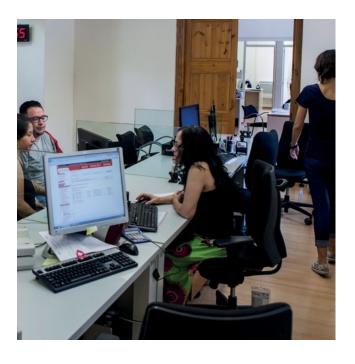


In 2023, social support continued to be provided to particularly vulnerable individuals and families housed through the Cession, Housing First, HUT, and "Reallotgem 1" programmes, to ensure proper use of the dwelling and compliance with the obligations set out in the lease agreement.

Grants for housing payments

The 2023 results of the fair rent programmes, special emergency financial assistance, subsidies to help pay rent (for the three designated groups), benefits to pay rent, social emergency benefits resulting from mediation in the city of Barcelona and subsidies to pay the rent of private market housing.

- Fair rent. Benefits for rent payments: 334 cases were processed in Barcelona.
- Special emergency financial assistance for rent / mortgage arrears and access to housing for people evicted from their homes: 605 cases were processed in Barcelona.
- Subsidies to pay rent: 2,032 files for the people aged 65 and over, 8,403 files for people aged between 36 and 64 and 3,826 files for young people 35 years old and under were processed in the city of Barcelona.
- Subsidies for including private dwellings in Barcelona's Rental Housing Pool: 192 cases were processed in Barcelona.
- Benefits for rent and social emergency payments resulting from mediation in Barcelona and rent payment benefits: 1,281 cases were processed.
- Renewals of the supplementary benefit to continue paying rent and the benefit to assist in situations of loss of housing: 154 cases were processed in the city of Barcelona.

The role of Housing Offices is to examine and process applications and make proposals for their resolution.

Fair rent. Rent allowance renewals

In 2023, this subsidy awarded by the Government of Catalonia was generally aimed at people who were already beneficiaries of previous calls.

Resolution TES/2464/2020, of 23 September, establishing the procedure for monitoring and verifying compliance with the requirements for renewing the supplementary benefit to continue paying rent and the benefit to address situations involving housing loss, granted under Resolution TES/1969/2019, of 12 July, establishing the conditions for access to special emergency financial assistance from the Catalan Housing Agency.

The aim of the resolution is to establish the procedure for control and verification of compliance with the requirements for the renewal of complementary benefits to givecontinuity to payment of the rent and financial assistance benefit to address situations of loss of housing, obtained under Resolution TES/1969/2019, of 12 July in accordance with the provisions of its Article 10.

The purpose of renewing the right to receive these benefits is to make it possible for the applicant and the applicant's household to remain in their home, and to prevent the social exclusion that the loss of the home that constitutes their habitual and permanent residence entails or could entail.

Rent subsidies

Allowances for rent and social emergency payments resulting from the Barcelona Housing Consortium's mediation in Barcelona.

Barcelona City Council's budget for allocating payment grants for rental housing enabled the launch of two calls for grant applications, managed by the Barcelona Housing Consortium.



These are services to maintain rental housing and for families referred from the mediation service provided by the Housing Offices Network.

The Housing Consortium's Standing Committee approved the following:

- On 19 December 2023, the 2023 call for applications was approved for the provision of emergency social assistance arising from mediation in the city of Barcelona. It was published in the official gazettes on 6 and 17 April 2023.
- On 24 November 2023, an amendment to the 2023 call was approved, increasing the budget allocated to these benefits.
- Also on 14 July 2023, the 2023 call for applications for financial assistance to pay rent in the city of Barcelona was approved and published in the official gazettes on 10 and 11 August 2023, with a total budget of €4,206,065.62.

The target groups for the 2023 call for mediation were as follows:

- Household units entering into a lease agreement after completing a stay and inclusion process in a residential facility within the Barcelona Inclusion Housing Network, or in a residential facility for women survivors of gender-based violence, where the referring service is either SARA (Assistance, Recovery and Shelter Service) or ABITS (Agency for a Comprehensive Approach to Sex Work), both City Council services. This also includes individuals who, at the request of the Assessment Board for allocating housing in social emergency situations, have lost their usual residence and sign a new lease agreement.
- Household units that have received support from the mediation service of the Barcelona Housing Offices Network and:
 - Have signed a lease agreement through Barcelona's Rental Housing Pool.
 - Have agreed to a minimum reduction of €50 per month in rent, provided they submitted their requests within a maximum period of 120 days, as of the effective date of the agreed reduction signed with the owner. Exceptionally, the requirement for a rent reduction agreement shall not be enforceable if legal proceedings have been initiated for non-payment of rent or if there has been an official notification of a claim for the rent arrears by the owner.
 - Have received a reliable communication from the owner warning them of the termination of the lease agreement and, through the mediation services of the housing offices, they are in a position to maintain it.
- Household units that have previously benefited from the temporary guaranteed assistance or the housing access support service provided by the Social Rights Area of Barcelona City Council.

INTRODUCTION

Within the framework of the **Barcelona Housing Consortium**, formed by the Government of Catalonia and Barcelona City Council, the **Barcelona Social Housing Council** (BSHC) was established as a consultative and participatory body on housing policy in the city.

The BSHC was set up on 26 February 2007, representing an opportunity for making effective a new citizen participation space on the matter of housing, aimed at providing a tool for generating opinions and proposals and at promoting their analyses.

The Social Housing Council came about from the experiences of the social housing working group set up by Barcelona City Council's Municipal Social Welfare Council. The specificity and importance of the issues compelled the Barcelona Housing Consortium to create the BSHC and provide it with a broad representation of the various social stakeholders, some more specific functions and deeper involvement in, and monitoring of, issues relating to housing policy and the Consortium's activity.

This Council was therefore created in response to a new social framework where housing has become a priority issue at all levels, and which therefore needs a new participatory framework that ensures representativeness and plurality. A forum for discussion, participation and sharing was therefore created that enriches municipal housing policy.



FUNCTIONS OF THE SOCIAL HOUSING COUNCIL

- To encourage coordination and collaboration between citizen organisations and associations, representatives of the professional sectors and municipal representatives, in order to promote participatory processes and reports and their submission to the City Council or to the relevant bodies of the City Council or the Catalan Government.
- To provide advice on all matters for which the Standing Committee of the Barcelona Housing Consortium, Barcelona City Council or the Government of Catalonia request an opinion.
- Through the chair of the Consortium and in accordance with the provisions of Article 17.a of these regulations, they can also request the opinion of the Social Housing Council, the District Councils and the sectoral councils of Barcelona City Council, as well as representative associations with aims related to social housing.
- To submit proposals for action to the Consortium's General Board, either at the initiative of the Standing Committee or the Full Council, so that the Consortium may address, as appropriate, Barcelona City Council, the Government of Catalonia or other competent public authorities.
- To receive action proposals from the Consortium's General Board concerning potential appeals to other public administrations, assess and discuss them, and actively report back to the Board.
- To monitor, evaluate and report on the implementation of the Barcelona Housing Rights Plan, the Catalan Housing Rights Plan and the Right to Housing Act, as well as other public housing policies related to housing of Barcelona City Council and the Government of Catalonia within the city. The balance sheet and the annual monitoring and compliance report are available to Council members on the Council's intranet.
- To report on the drafting of municipal byelaws and other general provisions affecting housing, as well as on municipal

actions related to its sector of activity.

- To participate in the process of defining new binding indicators for the city's housing market.
- To approve the annual report.
- To approve its own internal rules and regulations.
- To prepare the proposal for the draft budget section of the Council for inclusion in the draft budget to be approved by the General Meeting of the Barcelona Housing Consortium.
- To request, through a resolution passed by an absolute majority, the launch of an ad hoc or external participatory process.
- To carry out any other consultative or participatory functions assigned by the Consortium's Standing Committee or included among the functions of Sectoral Councils or participatory bodies as set out in current regulations governing citizen participation in Barcelona City Council.

THE COUNCIL'S ORGANISATION

The Barcelona Social Housing Council is the Consortium's consultative and participatory body. It operates in accordance with its internal regulations, the Consortium's Articles of Association and the City Council's rules for citizen participation. The Council is organised into a Plenary Assembly, a Standing Committee and working groups. It includes the Chair, Vice-Chairs, (voting) members and the Technical Secretariat.

The plenary assembly is made up of more than a hundred members, representing the Catalan Government and the City Council, municipal political groups, public bodies and companies related to housing planning and construction, social housing developers and managers, construction companies, housing developers and owners, platforms and organisations for the defence of rights, foundations and federations

of third-sector organisations, financial or real estate entities, cooperative organisations, university social councils, professional associations, individuals and representatives of the judiciary.

The Standing Committee is made up of the Chair, the Vice-Chairs and representatives of the different stakeholder groups and sectors belonging to the Plenary, chosen from each group and ratified by the Plenary.

INTERNAL WORK

A summary of the state of the Council's working groups set up to optimise participation and the work carried out by the Council's members on the various tasks and challenges set throughout the year, and make them more effective and dynamic, can be found below. An account is also given of the meetings of the Standing Committee and the Plenary.

WORKING GROUPS

INTERNATIONAL SOCIAL HOUSING FESTIVAL WORKING GROUP

Objective

To promote and coordinate the participation of organisations in the events surrounding the International Social Housing Festival, held in Barcelona in June 2023.

Main issues addressed

- Organising and planning the programme for ISHF Barcelona 2023.
- Identifying opportunities for Barcelonabased organisations to participate in ISHF 2023.

Composition:

The following are proposed as specific goals:

HOUSING OFFICES NETWORK

- Conduct a study to comprehensively remodel and modernise the facilities of the Housing Offices Network.
- Continue measures to improve the management of the Housing Offices: mandatory appointments, unified IT system, mobile team of information staff, etc.
- Provide electronic means to better manage citizen queues (tablets/laptops)
- Consolidate the HAB-ET ("Habitatge el truca") call-back service, a telephone platform that manages the catalogue of services provided by housing offices.
- Fill vacant Housing Office manager positions.
- Increase frontline information staff at Housing Offices for specific grant campaigns.

DECENT USE OF HOUSING

- Consolidate the coordination of the various programmes within the Department for the Dignified Use of Housing (rent support, housing pool, advisory and mediation service, intervention and mediation services, etc.) to optimise management.
- Speed up the processing of applications submitted for different grants and subsidies and minimise the documentation to be submitted
- Improve coordination between housing services and social services in cases involving the risk of losing a primary residence, as well as intervention at the point of eviction.
- Establish communication channels and stable working spaces with other systems and stakeholders involved in housing emergency situations, in order to improve interventions and enhance the effectiveness and efficiency of responses.

RENOVATION GRANTS

- The core aim of the European NextGeneration funds is to ensure that buildings and homes achieve a minimum reduction in both non-renewable primary energy consumption and energy demand.
- Achieve the interim milestone of 3,004 homes effectively rehabilitated by 31 December 2024
- Promote renovation through funding calls supported by the European Union's NextGenerationEU funds, under Regulation (EU) 2021/241 of the European Parliament and of the Council of 12 February 2021, within the framework of the Recovery, Transformation and Resilience Plan, enabling the promotion of housing renovation from the perspective of energy efficiency. These funds set a target of renovating approximately 15,000 homes in the city of Barcelona. In Spain, they form part of the Recovery, Transformation and Resilience Plan, whose first pillar is focused on boosting public and private investment to redirect the productive model and drive the green transition, decarbonisation and energy efficiency.
- Launch a specific call for the renovation of housing interiors aimed at incorporating properties into Barcelona City Council's Social Rental Housing Pool.
- End the works for all approved projects under the call for common elements.
- Promote a call for proposals to improve accessibility and eliminate architectural barriers in the city of Barcelona.
- Maintain social cohesion grants to support access to renovation for the most vulnerable groups.

REGISTER OF APPLICANTS FOR SOCIAL HOUSING, ALLOCATION OF DWELLINGS AND SOCIAL EMERGENCY BOARD WITHIN THE FRAMEWORK OF THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE NEW HOUSING INFORMATION SYSTEM (SIHAB)

- Launch procedures through the online Procedures Portal.
- Streamline and simplify the process and communication with the public during social housing allocation calls via digital platforms.
- Continue the process of phasing out paper documentation.
- Develop and improve the management computer system to streamline procedures.

The Barcelona Housing Consortium's current expenditure corresponds to the transfers to be made over the financial year to the municipal bodies responsible for the management tasks entrusted to the Consortium during the year. These are formalised under the respective collaboration agreements with municipal bodies, the Municipal Institute of Housing and Renovation and the Municipal Institute of Urban Landscape and Quality of Life, in order to comply with the provisions of the Government Agreement of 3 January 2023 in favour of the Centre for Telecommunications and Information Technologies.

BUDGETARY TARGETS

The Government of Catalonia budgets for 2024 have not been approved to date; therefore, the 2023 budgets, approved by Act 2/2023, of 16 March, have been extended.

As in the last approved budgets in 2023, this includes funding for the management of the Housing Office Network and the advice and information service they provide: the operations of Barcelona's Register of Applicants for Social Housing, the management of rent allowances, as well as the management of social housing and young-person housing pools.

With regard to the income budget, the total amounts to €44.69 million. Of this, €10.55 million comes from current transfers by the consortium's partner administrations. A further €6 million is allocated to renovation grants under the 2024 calls, while €17.15 million will be directed to calls financed by the NextGeneration EU funds. In addition, €5.66 million is allocated to the 2024 rent-payment subsidy call, and €5.33 million is earmarked for the extension of the agreement with the Hàbitat3 Tercer Sector Social Foundation.
